The piece of writing below is an example of the exposition genre. An exposition provides information favouring a particular point of view. Advertisements, newspaper editorials, book reviews and speeches are all examples of the exposition genre.

## **Exclamation Marks**

Exclamations are used to show strong feelings such as fear, anger or surprise. An exclamation mark at the end tells the

reader that what is written is to be expressed forcefully.

For example: Help! Stop it!

Proper nouns: Words in the titles of books or stories begin with capital letters and the titles are enclosed in quotation marks.

Remember this when punctuating sentences 2 and 5. The passage needs 3 additional apostrophes. One is an apostrophe showing ownership and the other 2 are in contractions.
